# 5th Annual Fort Hamer Bridge Run Scheduled for November 6

The 5th annual Fort Hamer Bridge Run will take place on Saturday, November 6, 2021 at 7:45 am. This family-oriented 5k run/walk over the Fort Hamer Bridge will end with a large After Party.

In 2020, the race was held with no After Party and under vastly different circumstances due to social distancing and the Covid-19 pandemic. In 2021, the environment will be totally different – more fun, more participants and a super-stage After Party that in previous years has been noted as "one of the best runners have experienced."

# **Business Spotlight: Bunker Hill Vineyard & Winery**

Bunker Hill Vineyard and Winery, located just east of Parrish, is owned by Larry and Lenora Woodham. The vineyard is a labor of love for the couple, who planted their vines 20 years ago and tended to them every single day for 12 years before they bottled their first wines in the summer of 2009.

The doors to their winery opened in 2010 and they now offer over 40 varieties of unfiltered and natural fruit and grape wines, all made by hand. "We are a Certified Florida Farm Winery," said Lenora, "and 97% of all our wines are grown in the soils of Florida."

Their wines are made from Muscadine grapes, native to the southeast US, and their goal in the production process is taste, bouquet and flavor of the grape. Typical wines are focused on clarity, which is achieved through an arduous filtration process. Larry and Lenora use a unique, year-long, labor intensive process to achieve clarity, so all of their wines are at least one year old before they are bottled. This process allows the bouquet to mature and stabilize and the flavor to be its best.

Plan for Parrish: The North Central Overlay, Parrish Village Overlay and Neighborhood Action Plan by Gretchen Fowler

The North Central Overlay (NCO) was established over 2 decades ago to provide a guide to the overwhelming growth in Parrish and surrounding areas. The NCO covers a large area surrounding Parrish which includes the Parrish Village Overlay (PVO) and Parrish Neighborhood Action Plan (NAP). The PCA hired ZNS Engineering and Bob Schmidt an Independent planner, to work closely with PCA's Rural Development Committee. They have done extensive research on what the NCO is, why it was put into place, what it has done for the area, and what is recommended for the future. This is in coordination with the NAP and the PVO. The Parrish Civic Association is eager to hear input from the community on this project that the PCA has been working on for several years. The PCA is working toward a walkable main street to preserve some of the Parrish heritage before it is swallowed up completely by development. The PCA will share the working concepts and ask for input at the next PCA meeting.



Once the PCA receives input from the community, the PCA will take the proposal to the Board of County Commissioners. The proposal will include the overall plan, along with a plan for sewer and transportation to support the NAP. The Parrish Civic Association would like to show the Board that they are willing and eager to put time and money into Parrish. Instead of just making a request, the PCA has put a solution together and now is asking for help from the community. The proposal will be available for comment at the county workshop scheduled for August 31st which is open to the public.

The Parrish Civic Association meeting will be held on August 17th at 6:30 PM. The PCA is changing meeting venue to allow for more space. The meeting will be held at the United Methodist Church, in the Sanctuary (12180 US-301, Parrish, FL 34219). See below for the optional Zoom link information. At this meeting, the PCA board has invited Rachel Layton who will present the proposal on the North County Overlay (NOC) and Neighborhood Action Plan (NAP) starting at 6:30 with

time allotted for questions. As part of this presentation, she will also discuss:

- Parrish History
- North Central Overlay District
- Parrish Village Neighborhood Action Plan
- Parrish Commercial Village District
- Comprehensive Plan Map and Text Amendments
- Land Development Code Text Amendments
- Transportation Infrastructure
- Sewer Infrastructure

Commissioner George Kruse, At Large will be the second guest speaker and will discuss the upcoming workshop on the Future Development Area Boundry (FDAB), ask for input and be available to discuss the urban service boundary issue. The county workshop for the NCO and FDAB is scheduled for Tuesday, August 31st. It will begin at 9:00 am and be held at Bethany Baptist Church in Myakka.

### New Temporary Soccer Fields at Buffalo Creek Park

The PCA has been working with the county to get more sports fields for community use. The North Manatee Soccer Organization has had to turn children away due to lack of space. With the New United Methodist Church building under construction and the massive growth in the area, we just don't have enough fields. The PCA president, Gretchen Fowler reached out to the



parks department with the help of former Commissioner Priscilla Trace. A plan was made to utilize existing land as an internal project to make two more soccer fields.

The original thought was for the temporary fields to be on the county owned land for the future Parrish park site. The PCA agreed to partner with the county to provide temporary facilities. With the continued support of our current Commissioner James Satcher, it was decided to utilize other county owned land using in house resources. We now have two new soccer fields at Buffalo Creek park providing opportunity for more children to stay and play locally. North Manatee Soccer is also working with a local land owner to establish a public private partnership for even more needed soccer fields. More to come!

When I lived in the Denver area, I was doing some research in a library affiliated with a school of theology. I wanted to make some copies of an article, but I was out of change. I approached a professor and asked him if he had change for a 20. He looked at me like I was speaking a foreign language and replied, "What's a 20?" Now either his pay was so low that he hadn't seen a 20 for a number of years, or he took umbrage with my familiarity in referencing Andrew Jackson's likeness on U.S. currency. In either case I had to look elsewhere for help.

The English language is full of euphemisms and idioms that pump life into our language. They also lead to confusion for individuals trying to assimilate into our culture.

A euphemism is an expression substituted for one considered to be too blunt or unpleasant to use. In polite society it would be an abhorrence to say that Aunt Bertha was fat. Instead, we would say she was big boned. And her • Pulling my leg. son Joe Jr. being between jobs means he was unemployed. We wouldn't

say Uncle Joe died, and we certainly • Let the cat out of the bag. would not say Uncle Joe croaked off. • On thin ice. As an alternative, we would say Uncle • Joe passed away or we lost Uncle Joe. • Now when I hear that someone has lost • Uncle Joe, I always envision this poor • ole man wondering around the parking • lot of the local shopping center in bewildered confusion. How can you lose • Uncle Joe?


While Kermit the Frog could get • away with saying that his Uncle Joe • croaked off, for humankind the remark would be considered idiomatic.

An idiom is an expression used colloquially to convey a connotation not evident from assigning a literal meaning to the individual words. There are a bunch of these:

- Pot calling the kettle black.
- Make hay while the sun shines.
- Fit as a fiddle.
- Beating a dead horse.
- Cut the mustard.
- Burning bridges.
- Straight from the horse's mouth.
- Get on the bandwagon.
- Two peas in a pod.
- As right as rain.


So what can be done to help someone trying to learn our expressive language? Several years ago I had an employee from China who was struggling with

# Cooking with Cookie

### Take Advantage of Fresh, Juicy Peaches

Oh my goodness! Have you been to the grocery lately! Peaches, peaches, peaches. Fresh from the Georgia orchards. Take advantage of them now while you can and make some fresh peach recipes for your meals.

### **Spiced Peach Puffs**

1 cup water

1/2 cup butter, cubed

1 tsp. ground nutmeg

1/8 tsp. salt

1 cup all-purpose flour

4 large eggs, room temperature

2 cups heavy whipping cream

1/2 cup confectioners' sugar

1 tsp. vanilla extract

2 cups coarsely chopped fresh or frozen peaches, thawed

Additional confectioners' sugar

In a large saucepan, bring the water, butter, nutmeg and salt to a boil. Add flour all at once and stir until a smooth ball forms. Remove from the heat; let stand for 5 minutes. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Continue beating until mixture is smooth and shiny. Drop by tablespoonfuls 2 inches apart onto greased baking sheets. Bake at 400° for 25-30 minutes or until golden brown. Remove to a wire rack. Immediately split puffs open; remove tops and set aside. Discard soft dough from inside. Cool puffs. For filling, in a large bowl, beat cream until it begins to thicken. Add confectioners' sugar and vanilla; beat until stiff peaks form. Just before serving, fill puffs with whipped cream and peaches. Dust with additional confectioners' sugar. Yield: 3 dozen.

### Juicy Peach Crisp

6 fresh peaches, peeled, pitted and sliced

1/2 tsp. almond extract

1 cup all-purpose flour

1 cup white sugar

1/4 cup brown sugar

1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon

1/4 tsp. salt

1/2 cup butter

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F and grease an 8-inch square baking dish. Place the peaches in the bottom of the dish and sprinkle them with almond extract. In a bowl, combine the flour, sugar, brown sugar, cinnamon and salt. Cut the butter into the flour mixture with a pastry cutter until the mixture resembles crumbles. Sprinkle the flour mixture in an even layer over top of peaches and bake in the preheated oven for about 45 minutes



until peaches are bubbling and the topping is browned.
Yield: 6 servings.

### Spicy Peach Glazed Pork Chops

1 cup fresh peach preserves
1 1/2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 tsp. chili paste
4 boneless pork chops
1 tsp. ground ginger
1 pinch ground cinnamon
Salt and pepper to taste
2 Tbsp. vegetable oil

1/2 cup white wine

In a small bowl, mix together peach preserves, Worcestershire sauce and chili paste. Rinse pork chops and pat dry. Sprinkle the chops with ginger, cinnamon, salt and pepper. Heat oil in large skillet over medium-high heat. Sear the chops for 2 minutes on each side. Remove from pan and set aside. Pour white wine into pan and stir to scrape the bottom of the pan. Stir in peach preserves mixture. Return the chops to pan and flip to coat with the sauce. Reduce heat to medium low and cook the chops for about 8 minutes on each side till done.

Yield: 4 servings.

### Peach and Tomato Caprese Salad

2 Tbsp. olive oil

1 Tbsp. balsamic vinegar

1 tsp. salt, divided

2 large tomatoes, thinly sliced

2 ripe peaches, halved, pitted and sliced into half moons

6 fresh basil leaves

1 (8-oz.) ball fresh mozzarella, thinly sliced

Whisk olive oil, balsamic vinegar and 1 pinch salt together until dressing is smooth. Alternate tomato slices, peach slices, basil leaves and mozzarella slices in layer on a platter. Drizzle dressing over salad and sprinkle with remaining salt.

Yield: 4 servings.

I hope you enjoy the remainder of the summer and these fresh peach recipes.

# Slovenia (Ljubljana) Ralph Bellrose



Triple Bridge, Ljubljana, Yugoslavia

Humans have populated the Ljubljana area for over four-thousand years. The Romans built a fort here around 50 B.C. to protect a strategic trade route; and, a permanent Roman settlement of 5000 to 6000 people, known as "Emora", was established in 14 A.D. Control of the city changed hands many times until the Middle Ages, when the region became part of the Hapsburg Empire. The name "Ljubljana", a German-Slovene hybrid, dates to that era. Except for a brief period under Napoleon, it remained a part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire until the end of WW I. Then came Yugoslavia, and finally in 1991, Ljubljana became the capital and administrative center of the independent country of Slovenia. The city's symbol, displayed everywhere, is the Ljubljana Dragon, representing power, courage, and greatness.

We stayed at the Hotel Slon. In Slovenian, "Slon" means elephant. According to our guide, in 1552, Maximillian II, Archduke of Austria and soon to be Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire, was returning to Vienna after marrying Princess Mary of Spain. He stopped in Ljubljana at an inn on the site of the current hotel. Maximillian brought with him one of his wedding presents, an elephant named Suleiman. Ironically, Sultan Suleiman the Magnificent was Austria's most powerful enemy at that time. Since very few people had seen an elephant on the northern side of the Mediterranean Sea, its presence caused quite a stir. In honor of this event future hotels built at this location adopted the name "Slon".

It was a short walk from our hotel to "Preseren Square", the center of the old city. Here you can see the famous "Triple Bridge" and the Venetian like canals designed by the famous Slovenian architect Joze Plecnik. Plecnik, who donated his time to the city, had a major impact on Ljubljana's public architecture, similar to Antonio Gaudi's influence on Barcelona. The square also contains a statue of Slovenia's national poet, France Preseren (a bit of a rogue), with a partially naked, female muse behind and above him. The monument was designed by Ivan Zajec and unveiled in 1905. The sculpture is sited




### Friends' Fall Book Sale Scheduled for November 17 - November 20




Peirce Nice Authors Book



# Interesting August Dates in Florida History

August 1, 1939 - The Florida Highway Patrol was formed by the Florida Legislature in 1939 and authorized to hire 60 officers to patrol the public highways and enforce all state laws in effect. The beginning salary would be \$1,500 a year, and the department was funded from sale of driver licenses.

August 1, 1991 - Actress Hedy Lamarr, aged 77, is arrested for shoplifting in Florida

August 4, 1842 - US gives free Florida land to settlers willing to fight Seminoles. Passed by Congress in 1842, the "Armed Occupation Act" authorized 160 acres to any adult male head of family who could prove that they had cultivated at least five acres and lived "in a house fit for habitation for 5 consecutive years."

August 5, 1763 - Britain takes over Pensacola, expands slavery over two-decade Florida rule. In 1763, after Britain defeated Spain and France in the Seven Year's War, Europe reshuffled its New World colonies the way today's Major League Baseball teams swap players: Britain acquired Florida from Spain in exchange for Cuba. France ceded to Britain the territory abutting Florida from the west to the Mississippi River, except New Orleans, which went to Spain along with French land west of the Mississippi. The British divided Florida into two provinces: East Florida and West Florida, divided by the Apalachicola River.

August 6, 1868 - Great Seal of the State of Florida adopted by Legislature

August 8, 1896 - Cross Creek, Yearling author Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings is born

August 9, 1956 - Two reporters were sent to cover Elvis Presley's appearance at Peabody Auditorium for the Daytona Beach Morning Journal in 1956. They weren't impressed. The following day, the paper didn't run any photos from the show, but let its writers tell everyone just how far beneath them they found this whole phenomenon. "The only way we can describe what he did is to say he 'performed,'" sniffed Dotti Einhorn. "If he were a woman we'd say he did an old-fashioned bump and grind routine while he alternately crooned and shouted into a microphone."

August 12, 1981 - Developed in Boca Raton, the first PC is released by IBM. Codenamed "The Acorn," the first IBM-PC was developed by a team of 12 engineers at IBM's Boca Raton research and development center.

August 13, 2004 - Hurricane Charley kicks off unusually active hurricane year.

August 14, 1842 - Second Seminole War declared over by Colonel worth; Native Americans go on to be removed from Florida to Oklahoma

**August 15, 1887 -** Eatonville, six miles from Orlando, was one of the first all-black towns incorporated in the U.S. after the 1863 Emancipation Proclamation that ended slavery.

August 27, 1960 - 16-year-old NAACP Youth Council President Rodney Hurst and dozens of his peers staged a peaceful sit-in protest at a "whites only" Woolworth's lunch counter in downtown Jacksonville, Florida. Throughout that month, Youth Council members had successfully organized peaceful sit-ins at Morrison's Cafeteria and other prominent lunch counters in the city. On this Saturday, however, the young Black demonstrators were violently attacked by a mob of more than 200 white people armed with baseball bats and ax handles.

August 31, 1979 - Hurricane Donna was born and quickly attained hurricane status as it heads west toward the Caribbean Sea. It was a Category 4 hurricane by the time it reached the Leeward Islands on September 4. Donna wrecked havoc on Puerto Rico and a portion of the Bahamas before turning northeast toward Cuba and the Florida Keys.



# Endangered Plants in Your Backyard


Florida is home to thousands of unique species of plants. A dramatically increasing malls, lot clearing, and more have taken up habitat the scrub lupine needs for survival. number of which, are on the verge of extinction. Sometimes, these amazing and endangered species are found near our homes. You may have handled them yourself, with no understanding of their rarity. Endangered Plants in Your Backyard is designed to raise awareness of our local endangered plant species, in an effort to keep our wild species wild.

Plant of the Month:

Scientific Name: Lupinus aridorum; Common Name(s): Scrub lupine Status: Critically Endangered Florida State

Order: Fabales Family: Fabaceae Genus: Lupinus Species: L. aridorum

Habitat: Florida scrub lupine, restricted to the Winter Haven and Mount Dora ridge systems in central Florida. This lupine is found only in a rapidly receding, highly endangered subtropical



Florida scrub lupine is a biennial or short-lived perennial growing from a soft woody base; the stems are up to 1 meter (3 feet) tall. Its leaves are obovate-elliptic in shape, 4 to 7 centimeters (1.5 to 2.8 inches) long, and 2 to 4 centimeters (0.8 to 1.5 inches) wide. The ends of the leaves are rounded, with sharp pointed tips and the bases are rounded; the upper and lower surfaces are covered with silvery hairs. The petioles are 2 to 4.5 centimeters (0.8 to 1.8 inches) long; the stipules are very small. The inflorescences are racemose with stalks 4 to 13 centimeters (1.5 to 5.2 inches) long, and the flowering portion 4 to 15 centimeters (1.5 to 5.8 inches) long. The petals are pale flesh-pink except for the standard, which has a black center surrounded by a maroon red area. The standard is about 1.5 centimeters (0.5-inch) long, and the keel petals slightly shorter. The fruit is 2 to 2.5 centimeters (0.8 to 1-inch) long, woody, and elliptic in shape, tapering to a sharp apex.


Lupinus aridorum, Florida scrub lupine is struggling for survival in a rapidly changing Florida. Development and poor land management practices are the two major contributors to its decline. The Florida scrub is part of an ecosystem which depends on a normal regime of periodic wildfires for maintenance. Roads, housing developments, retention ponds, strip

Unfortunately, most of the remaining populations of scrub lupine occur on privately owned lands that can be cleared at any time without recourse. If this shocks you, please contact the USDA and let them know.

Lupines are pollinated by way of bees. All native lupines can be extremely difficult to grow outside their native environments. In nature, they appear to be selective about where they will prosper and where they won't. Along with specific soil, water, and light needs, Florida scrub lupine require the services of specific mycorrhizal fungi and cyanobacteria for their roots to fully develop.

On the brighter side, Florida scrub lupine is the subject of a recovery project underway in Polk and Orange counties lead by Bok Towers. Researchers and scientists have been selectively breeding plants from the few remaining populations in an effort to produce more adaptable plants. Plantings have occurred at Lake Blue Scrub and other places in and around Lake Wells. The hope is that eventually the plants will produce enough seeds that will germinate and produce a sustainable wild population

Acknowledging all the hard work and lives already put into, and given up for plant and animal conservation, we can still do better, we can still do more. Currently, there are next



Want to see change? Write to Nikki Fried (FL Commissioner of Agriculture and Consumer Services since 2018) and your districts commissioner; let them know you want to see more protections for endangered plant life - or the existing protections enforced. Let them know you want to see programs for harvesting endangered life from lands slated for development. Let them know they need to do something - before it's too late.

# This Old History Story of Parrish

by Louise Lundy Simmons

This article was donated to me by Vivian Simmons Buice, daughter of Louise Simmons. I have enjoyed reading every word and hope that you will also. When I first came to Parrish from Sarasota in 1973, I met Louise at a Parrish Heritage Day celebration. When she found out that I was originally from Okeechobee, Florida we became fast friends for years. She was a very special person and I so enjoyed visiting with her

### Louise Lundy Simmons Story of the History of Parrish

My Great-Great Grandpa Lundy, William A. Lundy was born in Madison County,



Florida in January, 1848. Before coming south to make his living, William A. Lundy enlisted in the Union Army. He enlisted on April 21,1864, 3 months before his 16th birthday, at St Vincent Island Florida

He brought his 17 year old bride Margary Rose Henry Lundy (1853-1933) to the newly formed Manatee County area in 1870 by ox drawn cart. They came first to Oak Hill, which is now Parrish, and eventually cleared and homesteaded 40 acres in Manatee County (which had broken away from Hillsborough County in 1855). He discovered that a stranger had sent a letter to Tallahassee trying to steal this land, but William rode his horse

all the way to Tallahassee, beating the letter, and got his homestead.

During WW I, they had the Home Guards. They drilled once a week and kept their guns in a barn by the water tank next to the train depot. When the train blew its whistle, everybody used to run to the depot to see who got off the train.

The cows, horses, and hogs used to run loose. The stores would have to put boards around their windows at night to keep the horses from kicking them out until the fence law was passed. They used to drive cows through Parrish to the dipping vats. I was standing outside my Daddy's store watching them when a bull took after me. Van Williams was one of the cowboys and he ran by me and picked me up while he was on his horse. They had a hitching post in Parrish so people could tie their horses to them.

Mr. Sweat had a bank on the south corner of the Wauchula Road. After the bank burned down, Crawford and Rosie Bryant bought the land and built a store. They lived upstairs over the store. He added a Service Station and a Garage to the store. Mr. Baliff ran the garage. Crawford got out of the store business in the late 20's and farmed. He grew peppers and tomatoes. John Simmons and Bill Courtney, his son-in-law, farmed with him.

During WWII, they had an Army Camp east of Parrish on Hwy 62. They had Crawford Lundy's old store for the USO. They had dances for the soldier's every Saturday night.

Parrish had a skating rink under a tent. After it moved on, Mr. Grover Gillett made a skating rink out of his house. It was on the corner of 10th St. and 2nd Ave., west of the Methodist Church.

There were 5 grocery stores in Parrish at one time. Mr. Jess Lamb ran the store that Gettis Lee had on US 301. Donnie Hollaway worked for him. Then Gettis Lee and his wife were murdered in 1957. Mr. Wilson ran the store after that. Louise Simmons worked for him. Mrs. Lasseter had a store, then Wes Williams had the store for a while, and he later killed himself. Mr. Fryer owned and ran the brick building. George Lundy ran the store for him. Mason Tison also had a store.

The doctors were Dr Harrison, Dr. McCoy, Dr. Spooner, Dr. Lamb, Dr. Markey, and Dr. Myers. Dr. Lesley Britt had a dentist office over Mason Tison's store.

There were two restaurants, one hotel and three packinghouses. K.S. Parrish, Jasper Youngblood and Jess Lamb owned them. Gas was sold at three of the grocery stores until Service Stations were built.

I have seen water over the railroad tracks before canals were dug when it rained hard. Many people died from Malaria and the flu.

The first barbershop was built close to the water tank next to the train station. Big Ellis was the barber. They moved it to the corner of Wauchula Rd. Fred McClain and Big Ellis built another barbershop. Others that worked there were Barney McCroan, Louie Rawls, Hutton Tison, Mr. M. Scott, a man we called Dock, and Sidney Buice. Sometimes there were two barbers working at the same time. People from Willow had their hair cut there. There once was a poolroom in the back of the barbershop and dry



During the Boom, every Saturday night there were fights in town. The law didn't do anything about it. Mr. Hardy the Abstract man from Bradenton told a man that was running for office, and was going to Parrish to make a speech, that he had better be careful what he said, for he was about 1 mile from Hell and was closer than that if he cut through the woods.

Great-Great Grandpa Lundy sold their land in Parrish on SR 675, now known as the Crawford Parrish Place, and moved west to Erie and homesteaded 120 acres on the Manatee River. He found a free flowing artesian well which became nationally known for its medicinal values. He built a house, a school and a church around the "Fountain of Youth", as it was called by the people who came to drink its water, and extolled the curative powers of the spa. By many, it was believed to cure all ailments and add years of life to anyone who drank from it.

He also built a dock and built what became known as Lundy's Landing. A steamship named the Erie became a regular shipper of produce and other commodities along with other shipping vessels. William Lundy's son Jim, planted rice on this 120 acres and averaged 80 bushels per acre. After the railroad was built in Bradentown, now known as Bradenton, they shipped their vegetables and fruit by rail.

Great-Great Grandpa Lundy became a licensed real estate broker in August, 1881. He bought and sold a great deal of land in his lifetime. He also cleared and planted grove land and farmed produce. A legend has been handed down through the family that while plowing a field, Great-Great Grandpa hit something with his plow and it turned out to be a pirates chest full of gold.

After his death (it's told), his widow got tangled up with an Arcadia outlaw who stole all of her money. She passed away in 1933 while living with her daughter, Mary Emma Henderson, my Great Grandmother.

What a great history story of Parrish way back when, Parrish has changed some during the past few years, but we are still "PARRISH" looking out for each other. Please see story on Page 35 for more history about Lundy's Landing.

# **Perfecting the Process**

### John Phillips

"Progress should be the Product of the Process" Yohann Dafeu I wasn't always a professional guitarist.

In fact, after my service in the Army, I worked for a few years at a factory in Sarasota, Florida.

During this time, I learned two very important lessons:

- 1) Factory work is not for me I like being outdoors too much.
- 2)The importance of perfecting the process.

You see, this particular corporation for which I worked had very humble beginnings. It began in the founder's garage. From there, it grew and expanded into a massive company with multiple factories and clients all over the world. What was the secret to this incredible success? The founder of the company decided that, instead of merely trying to constantly improve his product, he would constantly improve and perfect the process by which the product was manufactured. By taking this approach, his factories are able to consistently and smoothly produce a better product, correct any errors, and adapt to change. The results speak for themselves.

I take the same approach to the study of the guitar, although this was not always the case. Like many aspiring guitarists, when I first took up the guitar, I just wanted to "get good." That was the goal. That was the product. I set out to attain that goal by whatever means I could. I copied songs from records, tapes, and CDs. I watched instructional videos. I bought a library of guitar books. I got all sorts of information from everywhere I could. Despite all of this, the finished product was elusive. My knowledge was very fragmented and disorganized. In fact, I discovered that I was actually getting pretty good at learning and perfecting mistakes. Why? Because my focus was on the end product (getting good) with very little thought given to the process (lessons, theory, technique, songwriting, routines, etc.)

Thankfully, all of that changed when I began studying with an excellent guitar instructor while I was at college. He took me back to the very beginning and made me start afresh; this time with an understanding of music, proper technique, ear training, and more. Everything that we learned was inextricably connected to everything else. I saw that he was following the same principle that I had learned and not applied at the factory: By improving the process, you improve the product. This is the method which I now use and it is the method which I pass on to my students.

In order to maximize your progress, you must ensure that you are practicing in the most correct and efficient way possible. Everything that you learn and practice should relate to everything else you practice. When you play a song, know what key it is in. Know how to play it in other keys. Know what substitutions you could make to the chord progression in order to make it your own. Pay attention to your dynamics. Experiment with vibrato, legato and staccato. Play around with various rhyming ideas. Is your picking smooth and efficient? How are you holding your guitar? Is there another, perhaps better way?

This seems like a lot to think about at first, but these are all elements which make the music that we like so enjoyable. When all of this becomes part of your standard process for practice, and you seek to refine that process daily, you will find that your skill increases exponentially.

Obviously, the best way to go about this is to find a qualified teacher who can guide you. In my opinion, one should always choose live lessons, whether virtual or in person, instead of pre-recorded lessons. In my experience, virtual lessons work just as well as in-person lessons and are considerably easier to schedule. What is important is that the lessons are taking place in real time. Only a teacher who is working with you in real time can notice and correct any mistakes which you may fall into. That teacher will also be able to identify your learning style, as well as your strengths

and weaknesses, and tailor your practice routine to your exact personal needs. With the instructor's help, you will be able to refine the process of your practice and, as a result, make consistent progress.

# Have Glasses That Are Customized For Your Lifestyle

Many people who live in Florida participate in several sporting activities. A great example of this is golf. Being successful at golf requires using specific devices for specific functions. All golfers know that they need to use a driver for long tee shots, different irons for shots of different distances, a sand wedge for greenside bunker shots, and a putter on the green. But what about being able to see clearly to locate the flag, line up your shot, and follow the flight of your ball?

Seeing clearly in different situations can sometimes require different pairs of specific glasses. Those affected the most by this are people who require a multifocal type of correction. A majority of these people wear bifocals or progressive lenses. These are both very useful types of lenses and they do allow for seeing clearly at different distances. However, they also have their limitations.

One of the biggest limitations of bifocals and progressive lenses is the fact that you must be looking through the correct area of the lens to see clearly for the distance that you are viewing. This can cause problems when participating in sporting activities (like golf). It can be difficult to play certain sports with multifocal lenses because as you are moving both your head and your eyes around, you may not be looking through the correct area of the lens to see clearly. Many people benefit from having a separate pair of glasses that has only their distance correction throughout the entire lens. This allows for consistently clear distance vision, even with constant movement of the body and the eyes.

Another limitation of multifocal lenses is the fact that, when reading or looking at a computer screen, they only provide a limited area to look through. This means that a person must locate the area of the lens that has the correct power to see clearly at that distance and they must continue looking through that area, without moving the eyes too much.

An easy way to overcome this limitation is to have a pair of glasses that is made specifically for reading and/or computer viewing. These glasses contain the correct power for the specified distance throughout the entire lens. This

allows for a much larger clear field of view and you do not have to search to find the correct spot of the lens to look through to see clearly.

Another example of glasses that are made for a specific function are custom made multifocals. The advantage of these lenses is that they allow the wearer to see clearly at more than one distance, but they provide a larger field of view than progressive lenses. Computer bifocals are made so that the user can look through the top part of the lenses to see clearly at mid-range, utilizing the entire width of the lens. You can then look through the bottom part to see clearly for reading at a closer distance.

Consider getting an extra pair of glasses that is custom made for an activity that you spend a lot of time doing. It will enhance your performance and give you comfortable, clear vision. Worried about the extra cost? Think about that \$450.00 new driver that you got this year to improve your golf game. Your extra pair of glasses will be significantly less expensive than that and they will most likely be with you for a longer period of time. Especially once Taylor Made and Callaway come out with next year's new drivers!















# Meet Peirce Nice, Author Nine Lives of Good Kitty, Moving and Making New Friends

Parrish has a newly published author, Peirce Nice. He has written a book for children who are relocating and what better time with so many new families moving to Parrish these days. Nine Lives of the Good Kitty, Moving and Making New Friends is a heart-warming tale about the difficulties young children experience during a family move as seen through the eyes of the family's pet cat, Good Kitty.



The story is actually from Peirce's experience when moving to the Middle East. He had many moves as a child, domestically and internationally. His family bought Good Kitty, who is the main character in the book, in Vietnam from a food market and the darker and smaller kitty, Nina, was adopted into his family sometime in the middle of their 3 year stay in the Middle East.

At 12 years old, exiting the airport, his cat was brought out to the family in a kennel. "It may have been projection on some level, but I really felt like I could see and understand the fear and confusion in his eyes. He, too, had no real understanding of why this was happening and no control over it. At that moment, the seed for the book idea was planted," says Peirce.

During our interview he also stated, "I never saw a book like this, especially as a child, but essentially I just wanted to write a book that could help families and children confront, discuss and process the relocation of their family. My cat was one of the few sources of comfort and familiarity I had during many of these moves and a part of me hoped he could continue to bring that peace to other people. It took coming into early adulthood to feel like I had a remote enough understanding of my own feelings to confidently formulate it into a book and make an effort to share it with the world, and any families that had to deal with moving therein."

Peirce had been moving around from state to state before he had even begun looking forward to the release of each forming any memories. The first place he really remembers was Hawaii, where book as it comes from the publisher!

he'd moved to at the age of around 2 and a half, and lived there for 6 years. His parents met in the military, which probably explains most of it, however his father eventually began working for the embassies abroad. Not counting inner-state or city moves, but rather state to state or country to country, he had moved 9 times before he was 18, thus the title of the book.

He got really into writing when he first moved to Vietnam. His imagination proved to be the one 'consistent' place he had (and had any control over) so he became obsessive with writing, literally hundreds of pages of fiction before he was 10. He always had a respect for people who read and especially the people's whose names he'd see on books he admired. He had a very vivid dream in his mind all those years of one day joining their ranks.

Peirce is currently editing more stories for the "Good Kitty" saga, the nine in the title refers to the number of stories. The script is then off to the art department and onward to the publisher. I have a feeling we will be looking forward to the release of each book as it comes from the publisher!



in front and to the right of the Franciscan Church of the Annunciation it was unveiled, because worshippers leaving church could not avoid seeing the naked muse. The city fathers decided the easiest solution was to plant a large tree in front of the church which effectively blocks the view for those who might be offended. (Strange but true!). Our city tour continued to Congress Square which was renovated by Plecnik in the 1930's. This plaza is the site of

many important events in Slovenian history. In October of 1918, the State of Slovenes, Croats, and Serbs deand caused some controversy when clared their independence from the Austro-Hungarian Empire during a mass demonstration on the square. In May of 1945, Tito made his first visit to Slovenia as the new leader of Yugoslavia and made a speech from the balcony of the administration building of the University of Ljubljana which faces the square. A demonstration took place here in June of 1988, demanding independence from Yugoslavia, which was finally achieved in

> June of 1991. In 1999, Bill Clinton became the first U.S. President to visit Slovenia. He gave a speech to a large crowd assembled in the Several square. important buildings are on the

square including: the baroque Ursuline Church of the Holy Trinity, the administration building for the University of Ljubljana, which occupies the former Governor's Palace, and concert hall built underground which can be converted into a bomb shelter. This deliberate design enabled the Slovenians to get construction funding from the Yugoslav government.

The University is one of the largest and most prestigious in Europe. It has no central campus. The 23 faculties and 3 academies are spread out all over the city. Ljubljana has a total population of 300,000 and the university has an enrollment of over 64,000 students. The young students give energy and life to the city and provide ample business for the many cafes and bars.

Other places of interest in Ljubljana include: the National Library, designed by Plecnick, with windows that open like a book, Ljubljana Castle, Republic Square, the Town Hall with its fountain and obelisk, the open air farmers market, and the oldest Mc Donald's restaurant in Slovenia.

Next time we visit the Postojna the Slovenian Philharmonic, with a Caves, Postojna Castle, and the Lake Bled area.





# Will Investors Change Behavior After The Pandemic?

The COVID-19 pandemic may end up changing our lives in some significant ways. To cite one example, it's likely we'll see a lot more people continue to work remotely, now that they've seen the effectiveness of tools such as videoconferencing. Education, too, may be forever changed in some ways. Perhaps just as important, though, is how many people may now think more about the future – including how they invest.

If you work with a financial professional, you may have connected with this individual over the past several months through a videoconferencing platform, rather than in person. Some people like this arrangement because it offers more scheduling flexibility and eliminates the time and effort of traveling to and from an appointment. Others, however, still prefer face-to-face contact and look forward to when such arrangements will again be practical and safe for everyone involved. But if you're in the first group – that is, you prefer videoconferencing – you may now wish to use this communication method in the future, at least some of the time.

But beyond the physical aspects of your investing experience, you may now be looking at some changes in your investment strategy brought on, or at least suggested, by your reactions to the pandemic.


For example, many people – especially, but not exclusively, those whose employment was affected by the pandemic – found that they were coming up short in the area of liquidity. They didn't have enough easily accessible savings to provide them with the cash they needed to meet their expenses until their employment situations stabilized. Consequently, some individuals were forced to dip into their long-term investments, such as their 401(k)s and IRAs. Generally speaking, this type of move is not ideal – these accounts are designed for retirement, so, the more you tap into them early, the less you'll have available when you do retire. Furthermore, your withdrawals will likely be taxable, and, depending on your age, may also be subject to penalties.

If you were affected by this liquidity crunch, you can take steps now to avoid its recurrence. Your best move may be to build an emergency fund containing three to six months' worth of living expenses, with the funds held in a separate, highly accessible account of cash or cash equivalents. Of course, given your regular expenses, it may take some time to build such an amount, but if you can commit yourself to putting away a certain amount of money each month, you will make progress. Even having a few hundred dollars in an emergency fund can help create more financial stability.

Apart from this new appreciation for short-term liquidity, though, the foundation for your overall financial future should remain essentially the same. In addition to building your emergency fund, you should still contribute what you can afford to your IRA, 401(k) and other retirement plans. If you have children you want to send to college, you might still explore college-funding vehicles such as a 529 plan. Higher education will still be expensive, even with an expansion in online learning programs.

Post-pandemic life may contain some differences, along with many similarities to life before. But it will always be a smart move to create a long-term financial strategy tailored to your individual needs, goals and risk tolerance.

# Pets "Back to Stressing" Over Back to School? Try These Tips!

As summer break winds down, vacation suitcases are unpacked, and the kids start stuffing their backpacks with supplies for a new year, you may notice your pet acting differently - what's the deal? It's not your imagination: this season can trigger behavioral issues. We often see an increase in training and behavioral questions from our customers right around when school is back in session.

When children suddenly aren't around to shower their favorite furry friend with attention, pets can feel lonely and confused about the decrease in human presence in the house. As autumn approaches, the weather changes, work schedules get busier ahead of the holidays, and people spend less recreational time outside with their animals. Loneliness, decreased physical activity, and change can trigger depression and anxious actions like excessive chewing, barking, and litter box issues.

Luckily, there are things pet owners can do to help relieve stress in pets and curb negative seasonal behaviors:

- Spend more productive quality time with pets when you are home. Take them on walks, actively engage in playtime or obedience training, or get children to engage with pets before and/or after school. Take them along to school drop off (If they like a car ride!).
- Offer special chewing, treat-dispensing, or puzzle-type toys to keep pets' minds occupied when human companions are away from home. Give these coveted toys only when you are leaving the house.
- Ignore excessive barking whenever possible. If you open the door to let your dog in because they are barking, this teaches the dog that barking gets the door opened. Wait for a pause in barking before letting them inside. Try not to use the backyard as a place of banishment or punishment, and as always, never leave a dog outdoors in the heat.
- Clean litter boxes and small animal cages regularly. Often, people can get busier in the fall and this unpleasant task can fall by the wayside, triggering pets to eliminate in all the wrong places. Setting an alarm on your phone to remind yourself to clean them regularly can be useful.
- Consider hiring a dog walker to come a couple of hours after you've left the house to help Fido expend energy before they come up with a creative way to destroy your furniture or shoes.

Resolutions to behavioral problems in pets are most effective when they address the root causes. Otherwise, you are just being reactive to the symptoms. So while barking might be the problem, the actual problem isn't the barking, it's the stress that causes barking. # **FEMA Releases New Flood Maps**

Flood insurance rates may be changing for homeowners in the Tampa Bay area due to the new FEMA flood maps that will take effect in Manatee County on August 10th.

Letter of Map Amendment & Letter of Map Revision-Based on Fill Process FEMA uses the most accurate flood hazard information available and applies rigorous standards in developing Flood Insurance Rate Maps (FIRMs). However, because of limitations of scale or topographic definition of the source maps used to prepare a FIRM, small areas may be inadvertently shown within a Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA) even though the property is on natural ground and is at or above the elevation of the one-percent-annual-chance flood. This elevation is most commonly referred to as the Base Flood Elevation (BFE). Such cases are referred to as "inadvertent inclusions."

For other small areas, earthen fill may have been placed during construction, thereby elevating a small area within the SFHA to an elevation that is at or above the BFE. This construction may have taken place during the time the engineering study was being performed or subsequent to that study. Because of the limited extent of the elevated area and the limitations of the map scale, it may not have been possible for FEMA to show this area as being outside the SFHA and so these areas have been incorrectly included in the SFHA on the FIRM.

### Requesting a Change to the Flood Insurance Rate Map

Recognizing that these situations do occur, FEMA established administrative procedures to change the designation for these properties on the FIRM. These processes are referred to as the Letter of Map Amendment (LOMA) process and the Letter of Map Revision-Based on Fill (LOMR-F) process.

Through these processes, an individual who owns, rents or leases property may submit certain mapping and survey information to FEMA and request that FEMA issue a document that officially removes a property and/or structure from the SFHA. In most cases, the applicant will need to hire a Licensed Land Surveyor or Registered Professional Engineer to prepare an Elevation Certificate for the property.

Upon receiving a complete application forms package through mailing a paper form or through the Online LOMC application (*hazards.fema.gov/femaportal/onlinelomc/signin*), FEMA will normally complete its review and issue its determination in 60 days.



# The Erie Village

The village of Erie (pronounced eer-ie) might sound like something out of a horror flick. While the origin of its name is still a mystery, the village itself was founded on a beautiful spring.

The Village of Erie was founded by William Augusta Lundy, an Alabamian who traveled to Florida after the Civil War to find better opportunities. Lundy, and his wife Margie Henry, first settled in Perry, Fla. But Lundy dreamed of something better.

In 1881, he discovered a 39-acre tract in Parrish and acquired it from the Internal Improvement Fund, according to historian Joe Warner in his book "The Singing River."

Still unsatisfied with the yield of the land, Lundy went searching for a different spot along the Manatee River. He found what he was looking for in present-day Ellenton. A freshwater spring emptied into the river causing a deep water channel close to shore Lundy thought perfect for a commercial wharf from which he planned to ship produce.

He acquired 120 acres surrounding the spring, which was known locally for its medicinal potential. People would come from all over the county to drink the cool waters of the spring, as they believed it cured ailments and added years to their life; it was the Manatee County version of the Fountain of Youth.

In 1885, another family joined the village. William Monroe Rowlett and his wife Eleanora Eliza and their children arrived in the area from Tennessee. They traveled by rail to Cedar Key, then by steamer ship to Bradenton. Rowlett loaded a small boat with his family, two milk cows, three hired men and all their furniture. The ended up in Erie.

Lundy built his home on the spring, then constructed a packinghouse and a wharf on the river. The wharf became known as Lundy's Landing, becoming one of the busiest wharfs on the river. Fruit and produce where shipped downriver to local markets. The wharf also housed a general store. On April 26, 1886, a post office bearing the name "Erie" opened inside the store with Joseph J. Biggs becoming the first postmaster.

Mystery still surrounds the origin of the name Erie. One version states that a steamboat with the same name sank nearby, but the name plate was salvaged from the pilothouse by locals and nailed to a tree on shore. For years, the nameplate was visible to boats passing by on the river and passengers assumed it to be the name of the village. However, several articles in the Manatee River Journal, the areas first newspaper, stated that the ship Erie was owned and operated by Captain Robert Warner and picked up passengers from a village with the same name. Whatever the case, it is apparent the boat and the town were connected in some way.

The village of Erie was never very big – it consisted of Lundy's agricultural enterprise, a small church and a one-room schoolhouse. The main pupils at the school were Lundy's 12 children and the 7 children in the Rowlett clan.

Rowlett became Superintendent of Public Instruction of Manatee County in 1892. With the exception of one term, he served as superintendent for 24 years.

Lundy eventually sold his property around the springs, opening the area up for development. The spring was advertised under the name "Ponce de Leon Springs" and people from all over the country were attracted to the land predominately for its healing properties. Some traveled all the way to Florida just to drink from the waters in an effort to cure their ailments, Warner said.

Erie continued to grow. In 1897, the general directory listed at least 25 families living in the area.

Surprisingly one of the main crops grown in Erie was rice. The lowlands near the river was the perfect environment to grow it. William Lundy's son, Jim Lundy, averaged 80 bushels of rice per acre, according to Joe Warner. Other crops were tobacco, cabbage, celery and lettuce.

Residents enjoyed frequent community fish fries on the wharf. William's sons Crawford and Jim were skippers who captained their own boas at an early age. The boys would take visitors on sightseeing and fishing charters.

In 1903 a railroad was developed with track set 1.5 miles north of Erie to a town called Fleming. Since rail was becoming the preferred method for shipping produce, many of the families moved north abandoning the small village. Lundy's Landing faded into obscurity. Even Jim Lundy eventually moved to Parrish. He was the last postmaster of Erie and the first in Parrish.

As Erie residents moved from the village, more and more of the land was used for farming and the spring became a source of irrigation – it was completely absorbed and only a dry depression remains. The original town of Erie died, but Fleming, the name of the new railroad town, never really caught on. As most of its residents were from Erie, they began referring to Fleming as Erie, thus creating a second town with the same name. Today the only remaining evidence of either town is Erie Road, one of the main thoroughfares in Ellenton.

# Parrish Fire District School Bus Safety...Keeping Our Children SAFE!

As the summer break of 2021 winds down to a close, this is the time of year students are packing their backpacks full of new school supplies and parents are meeting new teachers, as well as researching their children's new bus routes. As the Manatee County Schools have the vigorous task of keeping your children's safety paramount while



attending classes inside the schools, the Parrish Fire District strives each year to promote SCHOOL BUS SAFETY for our most precious cargo in

ur community.



School buses are the most regulated vehicles on the road; they're designed to be safer than passenger vehicles in preventing crashes and injuries; school zones and bus stops stop-arm laws exist to protect children from motorist traffic.

As the first school bell rings on August 10th, we are urging our community to drive attentively, be

ready for school buses, and to be aware of school children both entering and exiting at school bus stops.

As you are driving, please remember:

- Always remember, you must STOP when following a school bus and when approaching a school bus from the opposite direction on undivided roads.
- Red flashing lights indicate students are either entering or exiting the bus. Do not attempt to drive around a bus with its red lights activated.
- Pay attention for pedestrians watch for school crossing patrols and pedestrians and reduce speeds in and around school crossing zones.

Parents, talk bus safety with your children. Have them arrive to their bus stop destination at least 5 minutes before pick up time and teach them to play it SAFE.

- Stay five steps away from the curb
- Always wait until the bus comes to a complete stop and the driver or attendant signals for you to board.
- Face forward after finding a seat; always while the bus is in motion
- Exit the bus when it stops and look left-right for cars before crossing a street.

The Parrish Fire District recognizes this school year is going to look different for every family, but let's work hard to keep it safe for everyone. Whether you're a motorist, school bus driver, pedestrian, bicyclist, or a bus rider- PLEASE 'Stay Alert'

# Tampa Bay Offers Endless Possibilities

Tampa Bay is one of the nation's premier fishing destinations and for a good reason. Tampa Bay offers some of the best fishing mixed with some of the best places to visit. With all kinds of things to do and the great Florida weather, it is a hot spot to visit. I've been fortunate to call this area home my entire life. About 13 years ago I took it up a notch and now I call Tampa Bay work. I spend 275 days on the water as a full time guide and I can tell you that the possibilities of things to target seem endless. From Reds on the flats, Tarpon on the reefs, and awesome Grouper fishing inside the bay, it's a place that is filled with many different types of species.

Grouper fishing is something that is considered an offshore fishing sport, but little do people know we have a ton of Gag Grouper in the bay. You can troll for them and have a good bit of success, but I like to bottom fish or even free line baits back depending on the depths. If fishing offshore, you will want a good bottom machine to find these little ledges that hold those big fish. I love using the new Simrad 16inch with the all new 3D technology. This makes it a bit easier to find those secret Grouper holes.

Tarpon season has really been off due to rain and wind throughout May and June. At the moment, it is looking like a great late summer Tarpon run inside the bay. This is challenging but nothing is more rewarding than figuring out Tarpon in the bay... Gear for summer tarpon is pretty simple. I like the 60lb Fluorocarbon leader with 60 lb braided line matched with a 5/0 Daiichi circle hook. Match this with a extra heavy St Croix Avid Spinning rod and Daiwa Saltist reel, and all you have to do is hook the fish.

Reds in the summer are also a hot topic as schools still hang around the flats. Getting an early start is key when finding Reds this time of year as water temperatures climb quick from the heat of the day. Bait of choice for Reds would have to be cut bait on the bottom but don't forget to have a Mirrolure Mirodine tied up for those fast moving school that will hit anything in site...

Mangrove Snapper fishing is something I love to do this time of year. As the fry bait moves up onto the flats, the Snapper stack into the bay. Using this smaller fry bait will chum the Snapper to the surface and make for some great fishing for both the kids and adults. Snapper fishing in the bay is some of the best fishing you will do, and is steady action throughout the day

Last but not least would have to be one of my favorite fish to target. That would have to be Snook. Snook fishing in Tampa Bay is some of the best around the entire state and in the summer months, the big breeders stack up around the spoil Islands to spawn. This makes for some great inshore action that any bass fisherman from up north would LOVE to do. One of my favorite ways to target Snook is a frisky greenback matched with a Cajun Thunder float. It's just as good as watching a bass blow up on a top water at first light. Anyone that has not targeted Snook, is missing out on some of the best fishing anyone could experience. If you are looking to target one of the species above and want to get out on a good day in Tampa Bay, give me a call on my cell 813-727-9890. Tightlines!







# A Walk Through the Woods - Part 3

### Highlands Hammock State Park, Sebring, Florida

is located at 5931 Hammock Road, Sebring, Florida and encompasses over 9,000 acres. From Parrish, it is about an hour's travel time by car. Highlands Hammock State Park was born when Sebring resident Margaret Shippen Roebling fell in love with the old forest and helped finance the acquisition of several parcels of land to create a botanical garden that opened in 1931, later to become a Florida State Park.



Park Fees are \$6 per vehicle, tram tours are \$10 per adult and \$5 per child. There are on and off road bike paths, walking trails, equestrian trails, snacks and beverages at the Hammock Inn and camping spots. You may see deer, gators, many species of birds, bobcats, raccoon, armadillo and Florida panthers.


We walked all nine trails in the park, they are named according to the area and it's habitat. The Cypress Swamp Trail is entirely a boardwalk, the cypress trees and oaks are



Highlands Hammock State Park majestic and hundreds of years old. One measures 36 feet around and is over 1,000 years old. The Wild Orange Grove Trail smelled delightful as the orange trees were in bloom. Each trailhead has parking for cars and bikes, bikes are not allowed on the walking trails, and of course, neither are cars....

> If you are a history buff, don't forget to visit the Civilian Conservation Corps Museum, established in 1994 housed in a building constructed by the CCC. You can experience the Great Depression and learn about the lives of the young men who built Florida's eight CCC parks. The park has a significant number of New Deal era structures and is listed on the National Register of Historic Places.










