

Gates open at 11:00 a.m. following the parade and tickets are \$8 in advance and \$10 at the gate with kids 12 and under getting in free. Advance tickets are available at the Parrish 7 Eleven (corner of Old Tampa and 301 - cash only) and at the Parrish Y.

There are lots of things for the family and kids to do including bounce houses, rock climbing wall, bungee jump, obstacle course, kids fire fighters challenge and train rides. Cooking with Cookie

Slow Cooker Recipes

Sometime you just want to make something simple that can be cooked in your slow cooker and cook on its own. Here are a few that I like.

King Ranch Chicken (pictured at right)

- 4 cups cooked chicken, chopped
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 large green pepper, chopped
- 1 (10 3/4 oz.) can cream of chicken
- 1 (10 3/4 oz.) can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 (10 oz.) can diced tomatoes and green chiles
- 1 garlic clove, minced
- 1 tsp. chili powder
- 12 (6-inch) fajita size corn tortillas 2 cups shredded sharp Cheddar

Stir together first 8 ingredients. Tear tortillas into 1-inch pieces; layer 1/3 of tortilla pieces in a lightly greased 6-qt. slow cooker. Top with 1/3 of chicken mixture and 2/3 cup cheese. Repeat layers twice. Cover and cook on Low 3 1/2 hours or until bubbly and edges are golden brown. Uncover and cook on Low 30 minutes.

Yield: 6 servings.

Spaghetti Casserole


- 2 pounds ground round
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 8 oz. uncooked spaghetti, broken in pieces
- 1 (26 oz.) jar tomato and basil pasta
- 1 (14.5 oz.) can diced fire-roasted tomatoes
- 1 tsp. dried Italian seasoning
- 2 cups shredded sharp Cheddar cheese

Freshly grated Parmesan cheese

Cook ground round and onion in a large skillet, stirring until beef crumbles and is no longer pink; drain meat and return to skillet. Spoon half of meat mixture into a lightly greased 5 quart slow cooker. Top with spaghetti. Spoon remaining half of meat mixture over top. Combine pasta sauce, diced tomatoes, 1/2 cup water and Italian seasoning. Pour mixture over meat and sprinkle with Cheddar cheese. Cover and cook on Low 4 hours. Let stand 10 minutes before serving. Serve with Parmesan cheese.

Yield: 6 to 8 servings.

Uncle Jack's Mac and Cheese 1 (16 oz.) package elbow macaroni



1 1/2 cups heavy cream 1 (12 oz.) can evaporated milk 4 large eggs, lightly beaten 1/2 cup butter, melted 1 1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 tsp. freshly ground pepper 4 cups (16 oz.) shredded extra sharp Cheddar cheese, divided Vegetable cooking spray

Cook macaroni according to package directions. Stir together cream, next 5 ingredients, cooked macaroni and 2 1/2 cups cheese in a large bowl. Pour macaroni mixture into a lightly greased (with cook spray) 6 quart slow cooker; sprinkle remaining 1 1/2 cups cheese over macaroni mixture. Cover and cook on High 3 hours; reduce cooker to Low and cook 1 hour.

Yield: 8 to 10 servings.

Saucy Slow Cooker Pork Chops

- 5 boneless pork chops, trimmed
- 1 onion, sliced
- 2 green peppers, sliced
- 1 (8 oz.) can tomato sauce
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1 Tbsp. apple cider vinegar
- 2 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- 2 Tbsp. cornstarch

Heat olive oil in a large skillet over medium heat; cook pork chops in the hot oil until browned. Transfer chops to slow cooker; top pork chops with onion and peppers. Whisk tomato sauce, brown sugar, vinegar, Worcestershire sauce and salt together in a bowl. Pour sauce into slow cooker, stirring gently. Cook on Low until tender, 6 to 8 hours. Transfer pork chops to a serving platter; tent with aluminum foil to keep warm. Whisk cornstarch into sauce until thickened; spoon sauce and vegetables over pork chops.

Yield: 5 servings.

A Land Tour of Italy (Otzi, the Iceman)

In September of 1991, two German tourists hiking in the Otztal Alps on the Austrian-Italian border, discovered what they thought was the body of a recently deceased mountain climber. The body was partially frozen in ice at an elevation of 10,500 feet and turned out to be the remains of a 5300 year old man. Nicknamed Otzi, he is Europe's oldest human mummy. After archaeologists carefully removed the body and the artifacts around it, Otzi was taken to the South Tyrol Museum of Archaeology in Bolzano. Very soon the Austrian and Italian governments

got into a dispute regarding who had the legal rights to Otzi's remains since he was found so close to their common border. Meticulous research determined that Otzi was 100 yards inside Italy, based on a line defined by the 1919 Treaty of Saint-Germain-en-Laye. The South Tyrol's claim was upheld, but, they did agree to allow the nearby University of Innsbruck unlimited access to the remains for scientific research.

Forensic analysis revealed that Otzi was feet 5 inches tall, weighed 135 pounds and was approximately 45 years old at the time of his death. It's believed he lived in one of the valleys near Bolzano. Hair and pollen examination indicate that his diet consisted of meat, bread made from barley and wheat, fruits and domestically grown vegetables. Bone X-Rays suggest he was a shepherd and may have at one time been a copper miner, based on the high levels of copper and arsenic found in his hair. Using modern 3-D techniques, a facial reconstruction was created. Otzi had over 61 tattoos, making him the oldest tattooed human mummy ever discovered. Based on their location, it's speculated that these tattoos might have been part of a pain relief treatment similar to acupuncture, pre-dating its use by the Chinese. His clothes were well made. He wore a woven grass cloak and a coat, belt, leggings and waterproof shoes, all made of leather. Otzi carried with him medicines, materials to start a fire, a copper axe, a flint knife, a quiver of arrows with a longbow, and a sharpening stone. The axe was both a tool and a symbol of status. Some believe Otzi was a tribal chief.

The most interesting mystery is the cause of Otzi's death. Researchers originally believed that he died from exposure in a winter storm. However, a 2001 CAT scan found an arrowhead in his left shoulder. Medical experts concur that given the nature of the wound, Otzi would have died of blood loss even if modern medical procedures were available. A head wound was also discovered which could have caused massive brain damage. DNA Please see A Land Tour of Italy CONTINUED ON PAGE 25






Picking the Right Wine Help is Available

In a recent Wall Street Journal interview, David Trone, President of Total Wine & More was asked for tips about wine purchasing. One of his pieces of advice, "Read ratings and reviews. Many wine store feature review's notes and background information on individual wines. Find a critic or reviewer whose tastes resonate with yours."

We have all experienced frustration when, having read a rave review of a movie, we went to the theater only to be disappointed. What was the reviewer thinking?

Well, the great thing about people is that we are all unique with our own peculiar likes and dislikes. A critic's tastes and



This wisdom holds true with wine. I have found that my taste in wine rarely matches that of the noted wine reviewer Robert Parker. Does that mean that he is right and I am wrong? I don't think so.

I have nothing but high regard for Mr. Parker. His work has literally changed the wine

industry. Most feel for the better. But he and I just rarely agree on the question on the flavor profile of great wine. So, I never seek his opinion when searching for a wine for my personal consumption.

My recommendation is that you sample opinions from an array of critics on a particular vintage. Then, try the wine for yourself and judge whose opinion comes closest to yours. Do this a few times and you may have a handy reference going forward.

This same issue relates to your local wine steward. To be honest, few employees in a wine store are real wine experts. Most are hired to stock the shelves, sweep the floor and check you out at the register. But worse, many real local experts are so self-absorbed that when asked for a wine recommendation they tell you what they like. Once again, their tastes may be nothing like yours. So that's really the wrong approach.

Find a wine steward with some real expertise who is willing to spend some time ask-

ing you questions that will determine your favorite wine profile. Now in fairness you will have to do your best to provide her with more information than, "Cabernet... real smooth." Examples of past favorites will help or some descriptive narrative like, "Cab... bold, structured, heavy bodied and spicy." By the way watch for her reaction to that kind of description. If she looks confused - you are speaking to the wrong steward.

As always - enjoy the wine






Stop Doubting


Tech Help Drop In


Color Therapy for Adults



Some Interesting February Dates February 1, 2003 - Sixteen minutes before it was scheduled to land, the Space Shuttle

Columbia broke apart in flight over west Texas, killing all seven crew members.

February 3, 1870 - The 15th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, guaranteeing the right of citizens to vote, regardless of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

February 3, 1913 - The 16th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, granting Congress the authority to collect income taxes.

February 4, 1861 - Apache Chief Cochise was arrested in Arizona by the U.S. Army for raiding a ranch. Cochise then escaped and declared war, beginning the period known as the Apache Wars, which lasted 25 years.

February 6, 1933 - The 20th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was adopted. It set the date for the Presidential Inauguration as January 20th, instead of the old date of March 4th. It also sets January 3rd as the official opening date of Congress.

February 6, 1952 - King George VI of England died. Upon his death, his daughter Princess Elizabeth became Queen Elizabeth II, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland. Her actual coronation took place on June 2, 1953.

February 8, 1910 - The Boy Scouts of America was founded by William Boyce in Washington, D.C., modeled after the British Boy Scouts.

February 11, 1990 - In South Africa, Nelson Mandela, at age 71, was released from prison after serving 27 years of a life sentence on charges of attempting to overthrow the apartheid government. In April 1994, he was elected president in the first all-race elections.

February 14, 1929 - The St. Valentine's Day massacre occurred in Chicago as seven members of the Bugs Moran gang were gunned down by five of Al Capone's mobsters

February 24, 1867 - The House of Representatives voted to impeach President Andrew Johnson. The vote followed bitter opposition by the Radical Republicans in Congress toward Johnson's reconstruction policies in the South. However, the effort to remove him failed in the Senate by just one vote.

A Firm Foundation

John Phillips

"Do you wish to be great? Then begin by being. Do you desire to construct a vast and lofty fabric? Think first about the foundations of humility. The higher your structure is to be, the deeper must be its foundation." - Saint Augustine

"When I teach master classes, I tell young singers if the foundation isn't good, the house will crumble." - Sondra Radvanovsky

I began playing guitar in the 1980's. Like many teenage musicians at the time, I wanted to be a rock star. This was an age of guitar heroes and virtuosos, and I wanted to be part of it. I spent hours listening and struggling to figure out songs which seemed impossibly complex and difficult. I would hang out with the other kids who knew the beginnings (usually only the beginnings) to the iconic songs of the time. I learned some intros and famous guitar riffs. I could make you believe that I was pretty good, at least if you didn't listen for too long.

After a few years of struggling in this way, the inherent paradox of my struggle dawned on me. The problem with being self-taught is that your teacher doesn't know anything about music. I was like an architect trying to build some fantastically elaborate building on a foundation of sand.

I set out to correct this problem. I began studying with professional guitarists. I went to college to study music. I learned what music is and what makes it work. Once this firm foundation was set down, I was able to successfully build my other skills upon it.

All too often beginners on the guitar are content to learn a few songs by watching videos, learning from friends, and the like. While it is an admirable goal to play songs (that is the point of playing the guitar), one should not neglect to first establish a solid foundation. A student who learns the basics of music theory will soon find that they don't need someone else to show them how to play songs. They will know how to do it themselves, and in any key they wish.

They will also know how to write their own songs and play in a variety of styles. Knowledge of music theory greatly enhances a musician's appreciation and enjoyment of music. Likewise, a working knowledge and application of proper technique will greatly accelerate a student's progress, and will help to avoid potential problems such as repetitive strain injuries.

In conclusion, while we all desire to play our guitars skillfully, we must not neglect to build those skills upon a firm foundation. This will not only improve our skills, but will also greatly enhance our enjoyment of music for years to come.



Girl Scouts Thrive in North Manatee County

You've seen them at cookie booths outside the grocery. You've watched them participate in holiday and Veteran's Day parades. And if you're a woman, you were quite likely among their ranks when you were a child. We're talking, of course, about Girl Scouts.

While Girl Scouting is most often associated with cookies, camping, and crafts, the program has grown into the premier leadership development organization for girls in the country. The organization offers a variety of different experiences, in which girls get to try new things, develop valuable life skills and take on leadership roles.

"When girls plan and lead projects, whether related to community service, outdoor expeditions, cookie sales, robotics or any number of other Girl Scout themes, they gain skills and confidence that also help them do well in school," said Sue Stewart, CEO of Girl Scouts of Gulfcoast Florida. "It's about inspiring them to achieve personal and academic success now while preparing for the careers or life journeys they choose in the future."

The 105-year-old organization is thriving in our community. Within Parrish, Palmetto, and Ellenton, which encompass the council's M1 Service Unit, there are 415 girl members in 36 troops, and 142 adult members, most of whom serve as volunteers. Roberta Rodgers, Membership Specialist for Manatee County, is proud of how much Girl Scouting has grown in the region within the past few years.

"M1 is one of the fastest-growing areas in our council, Rodgers said. "In 2010, we had 208 girl members. Today we're serving double that number of girls."

Those girls, in turn, serve the community. Community service is a key component of the Girl Scouts leadership model. Local troops are involved with a wide variety of nonprofits and causes, ranging from animal charities to literacy initiatives, environmental protection, food drives and the homeless.

Recently, girls from Troop 408 led a donation drive to benefit The Umbrella Women, a local group that provides umbrellas, toiletries, bottled water and snack items to the homeless. Girls in the troop had the opportunity to accompany organization volunteers as they distributed the donations to homeless persons in Parrish. "It was an eye-opening experience for the girls to interact with those receiving their donations," Rodgers explained.

This time of year, Girl Scouts are particularly visible in the community selling Girl Scout Cookies. Troops use a portion of their earnings from the Cookie Program to fund service projects, along with educational field trips and special troop activities. All net earnings from cookie sales stay within the council, and are also used to pay for program development, maintenance of council properties and financial assistance for girls in need.

"By offering program scholarships to girls whose families are struggling financially, we ensure that all girls can receive the benefits of Girl Scouting," said Rodgers. The scholarship program, known as the Promise Fund, pays for registration fees, program books and supplies, and troop uniforms

One school has seen massive growth as a result of program scholarships. At Palmetto Elementary, over 22% of female students are active in Girl Scout troops.

But Girl Scouting cannot be funded by cookies alone. A recent grant from the William G. and Marie Selby Foundation, for example, is paying for repairs to the canoe/kayak launch and observation deck at Camp Honi Hanta in Bradenton. The camp hosts an average of more than 600 Girl Scouts and volunteers each month, many of whom are from Manatee County. In addition to canoeing, kayaking and fishing, camp activities include archery, a climbing wall and low-ropes challenge course, nature trails and a swimming pool. The 123-acre camp first opened to Girl Scouts in 1953.

Other funding organizations, such as The Parrish Foundation, help support program-related expenses. The Foundation recently awarded \$500 to pay for lifeguard certification training for two Parrish-area volunteers. Previously, The Parrish Foundation supported first aid/CPR training for volunteers.

"Volunteers are really the heart of Girl Scouting," said Kelly McGraw, Director of Volunteer Service for the council. "They are what make Girl Scouting possible."

Despite the impressive growth in the number of Girl Scouts locally, Rodgers noted the potential for even greater reach. "Within Manatee County, there are nearly 26,000 school-aged girls, each a potential Girl Scout," she explained. "Right now, we're only reaching an average of about 5.4% of those girls county-wide. With more volunteers in place, we can broaden our impact."

"Some people assume you have to be a mom, and have a girl in Girl Scouts, to be a volunteer," McGraw said. Yet, Girl Scout volunteers come from all walks of life – young women, grandmothers, aunts, even fathers. "We welcome anyone who shares our mission and vision to build girls of courage, confidence and character, who make the world a better place," she explained.

All volunteers must pass a background check and complete program training, and the council is preparing to launch a new business system that will make the onboarding processes faster and easier. "We're looking forward to welcoming even more caring adults into our council," said Rodgers.

The Facts about Cataract Surgery

Dr. Douglas K. Black

Last month, we discussed how the development of cataracts happens and I explained specifically what a cataract is. As I mentioned, in most cases cataracts can be easily taken care of through surgical removal. A vast majority of the time, this can lead to a life-changing improvement in overall vision. How does this happen?

During cataract surgery, the natural lens in the eye, which has become cloudy over time, is removed. This is done as an outpatient procedure and typically takes a matter of just a few minutes. A synthetic lens, called a "lens implant" is then placed into the eye to replace the natural lens that was removed. This implant is clear, just like the natural lens was earlier in life.

Aside from the main goal of replacing the clouded natural lens from the eye, one of the best benefits of having an im-

plant placed into the eye is that this implant can have the ability to provide clear vision without the use of glasses or contact lenses. For many years, surgeons have been able to give patients implants with the proper power to achieve clear distance vision. This has allowed millions of people to be able to drive, watch television, watch movies and attend sporting events without the need of wearing any vision correction, even if they required glasses or contacts to see clearly at distance for most of their life.

With this traditional form of cataract surgery, reading glasses are needed to see clearly at close distances. However, in today's world there are more specialized options available with implants. Patients undergoing cataract surgery now have options to have implants to correct astigmatism and even multifocal implants, which can greatly reduce the need for any vision correction at all.

There are some commonly believed myths out there regarding cataract surgery that simply are not true. One statement that I commonly here from patients when we discuss cataract surgery is, "They will just laser my cataract, right?" A cataract cannot simply be lasered away; it must be actually removed from the eye. The most modern versions of cataract surgery do utilize a laser to help make the procedure more precise, but cataract surgery is not simply a laser procedure.

Another commonly believed myth regarding cataract surgery is that some patients are concerned that at some point after having surgery, their cataract will grow back. It is not possible for any removed cataract to grow again. During surgery, the natural lens is removed from the eye and, once removed, it cannot re-grow itself.

As you can see, there are a number of great benefits that can be achieved through cataract surgery. It's amazing how such a relatively simple surgical procedure can lead to a big improvement in quality of life. If you've been told that you have cataracts that are having enough impact on your vision to warrant doing surgery, it could be something to actually look forward to!



newspapers," the manual read. "The rock will know what the paper is for and will require no further instruction. It will remain on the paper until you remove it."

Because I was only seven when the Pet Rock revolution began, my parents (erroneously) deemed me too "young and immature" to take on the necessary responsibilities required in the ownership of such a Pet Rock. (They were afraid I'd throw it through a window or at one of my sisters.) So sadly, I never had the pleasure of being the proud, mothering caretaker of a Pet Rock, but I remember my older cousins all getting one for Christmas that year.

[Truth is, even as a seven-year-old, I found the Pet Rock fad to be weird (not understanding its satire, of course) and wondered why my cousins thought it was so cool since it was just, well..., a rock for gosh sakes. No worries, though. A whole two years later, in 1977, I got to have my very own Chia Pet. Now that was the stuff!]

I know what you're wondering: Kathryn, are you really writing about the short-lived Pet Rock mania of 1975 or are you going somewhere with this crazy story? My point is, history is full of average people doing extraordinary things. Though Gary Dahl's silly Pet Rock invention didn't last forever (maybe six months,) it did make him a millionaire and led him to embark on a few other ideas he had. Sure, his later inventions, including the Original Sand Breeding Kit, which let buyers grow their "own desert wasteland," never matched the success of his Pet Rocks, Dahl continued to try and in 2001, wrote the book, "Advertising for Dummies."

Thomas Edison, kicked out of school at a young age for asking too many questions and then self-taught, became a prolific inventor of such devices as the phonograph, the motion picture camera and the long-lasting light bulb. His

most impactful invention, electric light and power utilities, is the reason you and I can watch The Walking Dead on our big screen televisions and why we can power up that new Tesla hybrid in the garage. (No, I don't have a Tesla...but they're cool!)

What about Austin Gutwein? Never heard of him? That's because he was only nine when his moment of inspiration came. Austin was moved by a video he saw showing children who were left orphaned by parents that died of AIDS in Southern Zambia. He couldn't imagine what it must be like to lose your parents, so he felt God calling him to do something to help them. But would could a young kid from Arizona do to help thousands of orphans in Af-

The idea that God gave Austin Gutwein was simple. Shoot free throws on World AIDS Day, 2004, for each of the 2,057 kids that had lost their parents. He would raise support from friends, family and his community and was able to raise \$3,000 that first year to help eight of the orphans. Doesn't seem like a big deal?

"Over the past eleven years, Austin's effort has turned into the largest free throw marathon in the world with an estimated 40,000 people in more than 25 countries participating in Hoops of Hope. By doing something as simple as shooting free throws, Hoops of Hope participants have raised close to nearly \$4 million. The efforts have led to the construction of the only high school in a rural region in Southern Zambia, four dormitories, two medical clinics, two computer laboratories, feeding programs, multiple water projects as well as the funding of a dormitory at an orphanage in Kenya and a school in India." (See www. hoopsofhope.org)

We could spend hours talking about all of the people that had an inspirational idea or invention throughout the ages. We could talk about how some made millions from those ideas or inventions and how others used the millions they raised to help mankind. In either case, whether for personal gain or gain for the masses, these were simply ordinary, average people that accomplished great or unique results. Some were highly educated, while others had little to no education at all. Some were adults when they had their breakthrough and some were mere children.

The message here is one of hope. A message that anyone, no matter what their age or skills has a purpose and can make a difference that lasts forever. 

analysis found traces of blood on Otzi's clothes from four different people. The interpretation is that Otzi was ambushed, killed or wounded two of his attackers and may have carried a wounded comrade on his back before he was ultimately killed. (Sounds like CSI: Bolzano).

We were able to see Otzi's mummy in a special exhibit at the South Tyrol Museum of Archaeology, in Bolzano. The body is housed in a chamber which is kept at 30 degrees F. and 98% humidity, duplicating the icy conditions in which it was discovered. His possessions are also displayed, including the axe, which is the oldest complete copper axe ever found. Otzi is not pretty, but he is fascinating.

As a final footnote, Italian law entitled the German couple who found Otzi a finders' fee. The government's initial symbolic offer was about \$8,000 which was turned down. The couple filed a lawsuit asking for \$300,000. With that kind of money in play, several other "finders" quickly appeared claiming they had a part in the discovery. Fourteen years later, in 2008 after numerous appeals and hearings, the case was finally settled and the Germans were awarded the \$300,000 they asked for in recognition of Otzi's discovery and in consideration of the significant tourist income that his mummy attracts. (Beware the Italian Courts)

Next time we continue our tour of Bolzano and take a bus ride in the Italian Alps.

There is the old story of the man who prayed to God every day to win the lottery. After years and years, he still hadn't won. Finally, one day as he was praying, he heard a voice, "Give me a chance...buy a ticket." Like the man hoping to win the lottery without buying a ticket if you are trying to hit a powerful drive but not set up in a powerful position, you don't have a chance.

When setting up in a powerful position you need to do several things:

- Widen stance slightly
- Make sure ball is positioned just off the instep of the front foot
- Tilt your spine so the back shoulder is much lower than the front shoulder
- Make sure the back of the lead hand is lined up with the back of the ball
- Head should be well behind the ball and weight over back leg

If you put your body in the power position you'll be able to fully coil behind the ball and maximize the power you have coming back to ball. The next time you watch the professionals play, pay special attention to their setup with the driver. This position allows them to swing up at the ball and launch it at the proper angle with the least amount of spin. Setting up with the shoulders level and the ball back makes you hit down on the ball producing too much spin and very poor launch angles. Basically we are setting up as if playing from an uphill lie. This allows us to swing correctly at a ball that is 4 to 5 inches off the ground. Remember: in golf there are ground swings for when the ball is on the ground and air swings for when the ball is high on a tee. Adjusting shoulder tilt is the best way to produce the proper power position and angle of attack.

Try this simple setup adjustment the next time you play and you'll hit the ball farther and straighter.

A column for seniors who find their views of today's American marketplace of ideas more than a little bit bizarre.

I guess it's a truism that the older you get the more complicated life seems. Inventions that are touted for making life easier often seem to make it more complicated. Technology drives it. To my mother a washing machine, refrigerator, gas range and oven was high technology. To my generation the dishwasher, clothes dryer and microwave oven was new and exciting. Then came personal computers and mobile phones (which originally were called car phones because they were too big to hand carry). But did they make life simpler? I don't think so.

My dad, God bless his soul, had a pacemaker. Great invention – unless you are in the habit of using a microwave to heat your food. Poor dad used to run for the bedroom under fear for his life every time someone warmed up some leftover pizza. See what I mean - complicated.

We recently purchased a new dishwasher at a price of about \$500. Not cheap. I was tired of washing the dishes BEFORE I put them into the dishwasher. What sense did that make? Well, the new machine looks great and it's really quiet. But I find that I still have to do a lot of "prep work" before loading the dishes and utensils into the machine if I expect them to be really clean and free of any unwanted matter.

Our kids were born into the computer age. I used to help my dad use his stereo system (remember those?). Lots of buttons and flashing lights. This was very confusing to my father, but a snap for me. I was young – I had no fear. Plus, if I broke it, I had no financial skin in the game. Likewise I call upon my kids every time the computer confounds me – which is way too often. They're patient and helpful – but I know that they are thinking that the old man is out of date and out of touch. Probably right.



Sheepshead - A Good Target for February!!!

Capt. Jason Prieto



As we enter the end of a typical winter here in west central Florida you can expect to see some of the coldest temperatures of the year. With that being said, we are also seeing one of the mildest winters in a long time. This should make for a great March.

Sheepshead are one of the most underrated fish targeted in the bay as most people don't know where or how to target them. It's rather easy and there are various ways to do so and most that start catching them are amazed at the fight they pick up, not to mention they are a delicious table fare. Sheepshead are a rather odd both shape and colors with a zebra like look and very wide midsection mixed with teeth like a human and spikes on just about every edge. Don't let their odd body fool you they are an awesome fish to target.

Sheepshead are found in both the flats and docks or you will also find them in the bay on the wrecks and ledges. They are plentiful and the big fish have shown up to spawn in the bay this time of year. These toothy critters love to munch on barnacles on the wrecks or docks so if you are fishing around pilings, you can scrape the poles to chum them up. Various baits work such as mussels and others, but I tend to use small to medium shrimp. They are easy to get at the bait shops and work good. I like to keep it simple on rigging by using 25 lb ohero fluorocarbon leader matched with a #1 Daicchi circle hook. I'll add just enough weight to keep the bait down on the bottom. Very simple but effective.

Finding areas for Sheepshead used to be a little more difficult back in the day, but thanks to technology and great programs to build artificial reefs, it's a little easier with the right equipment. My simrad matched with the all new 3D side scan technology makes things a lot easier. Navionics offers chips with hundreds of wrecks marked in the bay taking the guessing game out of finding that secret wreck. Mix this with the awesome 3D structure scan to see what you are actually fishing on, the wreck matched with the Rhodan Trolling motor to use the anchor feature you won't have to even throw an anchor. These are great tools that will make your fishing trip in the bay for Sheepshead a success.

Another great option is to get the bags and start targeting. Trout will be a great option on the flats. This is the time to bring out the bag of artificials as Trout fishing takes off this time of year. Trout stage up on the flats and really feed good around the warmer days of the winter. Fishing around the stronger tides will prove to be very productive. A live select shrimp suspended under a Cajun Thunder Float is a deadly combination. Another great option and one of my favorites is to throw a Z man paddlez matched with an 1/8 ounce jighead for an absolute awesome bait. Another great option would be the Mirolure 52M suspending bait. These are great options for Trout fishing and always remember to use a dehooker and handle all Trout with wet hands to ensure a successful release.


Several days ago, our team learned a few important nuggets we'd like to share with you.

Adoptions and News from the Humane Society of Manatee County



Why Adopt?

Every time you adopt an animal from the Humane Society of Manatee County, you enable them to save the life of another animal in need of a loving home. Each adoption also brings the Humane Society one step closer to becoming a humane community – a community where all adoptable animals find permanent loving homes and euthanasia is no longer accepted as a means of population control.

HSMC are committed to placing 100 percent of the animals brought to HSMC for adoption into permanent, loving homes.

FAQ About Adoptions

What does the adoption fee include?

Not only do you take home your new best friend, but all of the animals are spayed or neutered, microchipped and up to date on all their vaccinations. Pet insurance for 30 days is also included. Adoption fees are \$75 for all the dogs and kittens, \$50 for adult cats 6 months or older.

What is the Selection Criteria?

Pets placed up for adoption need to be of sound temperament and good health. Pets with a history of severe aggression or untreatable conditions are not suitable for the adoption program. Many animals undergo substantial medical and/or behavioral rehabilitation prior to placement for adoption. For example, the dog enrichment and obedience program, staffed by a group of dedicated volunteers, works with all the dogs to help them develop good manners as well as special needs dogs in order to resolve behavior problems that otherwise would be a deterrent to adoption.

Do you ever get purebred dogs or cats?

It is estimated that about 25 percent of the animals brought to the shelter are purebreds. If you are interested in a specific breed, check the pet lists to see if one is available. The Humane Society of Manatee County also works with purebred dog rescue organizations. Many times, these dogs are transferred from the Humane Society to rescue groups who specialize in adoption of a particular breed. That way HSMC has more room for mix

Can I return a pet I've adopted?

Yes, the Humane Society of Manatee County wants you and your pet to be a good fit for each other and recognizes that despite everyone's best efforts, sometimes this doesn't happen. Terms of return are:

The Humane Society of Manatee County will accept your pet back within 10 days of adoption. After 10 days each animal will be evaluated according to the HSMC selection criteria. The adoption fee is non-refundable.

The Fat Conundrum

It's February and we just got over a wonderful holiday season and like most Americans our wallets are light and bellies are full. We want to be a better person and often that means being in better physical condition. To put this all in perspective, 40% of Americans make New Year's resolutions, which is more than those who watch the Super Bowl. Only 8% of those will even achieve their goals. The best way to achieve your goal is to make it tangible. It is recommended to have a specific, realistic plan that clearly spells out what and how you are going to achieve your desired result.

So, we all know PC is going out of style. We are going to talk about fat. No one has to look too far to find it because Americans are gaining weight. The Obesity epidemic is real. Per the CDC, more than 1/3 of Americans are overweight, and as we get older the numbers rise. 40% of those between 40-59 are obese and 37% of those over 60 are overweight and sadly, of the 20-39, 37% are obese. We can see it in our daily lives and truly the younger population is catching up. Why is this important? Is it because we want to look good in a bathing suit? No, it is because obesity is connected with some fairly clear-cut medical risks such as Diabetes, Hypertension, Coronary Artery disease, and it raises our body's inflammation allowing certain cancers to grow, and it is associated with degenerative orthopedic issues. Being in good condition and not physically fit limits our quality of life. We don't climb that one flight of stairs when the elevator is slow; we don't go hiking or experience the outdoors; we opt for sitting rather than doing; and it is far beyond our time in this article, but is linked to poor sexual health, especially as we get older.

So is this the year to make it right? Is there something that could make things different this year than before? Are you finally going to get more control of your life, what you eat, how you eat and start exercising to enjoy an improved quality of life? The choice is yours.

The more information you have, the more well suited you are to deal with tackling an issue. I always tell my patients, "smart people live longer". That sounds crass, but I don't mean IQ. I mean asking the right questions, understanding your body, the food you put in it, and how you take care of it. It is my recommendation, if you have a chronic disease, learning as much as you can about it. Unfortunately, in today's world and the way health care is delivered your local Doctor does not have time to educate you on every facet of your health. I wish we did. It is so satisfying to see someone change his or her lifestyle for the better. No physician walking the planet wants their patients to always be in their office from the lack of correctable lifestyle changes.

I will tell you life is not fair. I used say that and then would follow up with, "Fair is where they put Blue Ribbons on Pigs." So, frankly it's not fair. Some people are more naturally talented, some are more attractive, some have more money, some have more friends and better relationships, and some can eat a dozen donuts and not gain any weight. It is real. The people whom gorge on donuts and potato chips are not genetically blessed. They have trained their bodies, unbeknownst to themselves, to metabolize differently what they eat. Its magic and it is called Leptin.

What is Leptin? It is a hormone discovered in 1990's that is secreted by fat cells and tells your brain you are full thus regulating hunger, food intake and energy usage. Studies show that most overweight people whom have problems losing weight have Leptin resistance meaning that Leptin is not able to produce normal results and stimulate weight loss. People have extra fat cells and the Leptin is going to the brain, but the brain does not respond and hence, the person is still hungry even though their fat stores are high. This is all cave man survival stuff, but we aren't cave men anymore. Factors that contribute to Leptin resistance include: overeating, eating carbohydrates, high fructose consumption, high insulin levels, eating grain and lentils, lack of sleep, high stress levels and exercising excessively.

So how are you going to fix this? It's simple... Do not eat starches, no refined sugars, no fructose, eat large amount of proteins, take Omega 3 fish oils, and do not snack. Additionally, when you exercise, do sprints and weight lifting, remove toxins such as processed foods, eliminate as much stress as possible and get to bed by 10 pm. Additionally, some studies talk about having cheat days when you are dieting. You are on a diet, in starvation mode and Leptin is low thus telling your body to store calories as fat. If you have a cheat day once per week, this will raise your Leptin level, which will cause you to metabolize calories rather than store them as fat. And now that you are a smart nutritionist, having high Leptin levels will lower your appetite and cause you to metabolize your calories more efficiently.

So what kind of exercise to do? Studies have shown that endurance aerobic, activities after age 40 raises your cortisol and hence promote the aging process. The best things to do are to focus on high intensity interval training where you get your heart rate at 80-90% of age predicted peak heart rate for 1 minute and then back down to 60-70% max heart rate for 2 minutes; then repeat the cycle which is mainly an anaerobic process. You know how an Olympic sprinter looks, lean and muscular, that's what anaerobic training does.

Another form of anaerobic training is weight training or resistance training. Weight or resistance training is also important especially as we get older. After age 35, we lose 10% of our lean muscle mass every decade. So imaging you are 55 and overweight. It goes to reason because your basal metabolic rate is 20% less than when you were 35, that 20% of calories you were once used to eat, will go into fat stores.

It is all a little complicated. Like that saying goes, "Rome was not built overnight." It took decades to gain that extra 10-20-30 or 50% of extra body fat and doing it smartly, healthy and in a way that will keep the weight off, takes time. Maximal, healthy weight loss is 2 lbs. per week. That is intense and doing it week in and week out over a year is

amazing. Further, when it comes to weight loss, 70% is what you eat and 30% is the exercise. However to lose weight without losing too much muscle mass, requires both diet and exercise.

Regarding exercise, slow resistance training or time under tension being longer will cause increased muscle gains and is also more anaerobic, hence it chews up fat. This is not easy to do independently. It often requires a trainer



or someone whom has been exercising for so long they are extremely disciplined. No one needs to know how a car engine works to drive a car. They put a key in the ignition, turn it on, and go. Same with exercise and weight loss, you really just want to have a solution. I have it for you that succinctly will put all these complicated metabolic, nutrition and exercises at the tip of your fingers and all you have to do is put the key in, so to speak. It is called KOKO Fit Club.

A MIT physiatrist working with professional athletes developed a cutting edge diet and exercise program. The program will tell you what to do every time you go and will track it, grow with your progress, and communicate your progress to you via email regarding your personal, KOKO health plan. Additionally, you will be given a personal diet to follow to achieve your goals. If it is weight loss, you will get a calorically restricted diet that will allow efficient, healthy weight loss. If it muscle gain, it will be a diet of increased protein intake. There are also exercise plans to help people with specific health conditions such as back pain, Diabetes, etc. For you golfers out there, there is an exercise program to improve your golf swing, increase your drive distance and shave your handicap.

I ascribe by KOKO. I am like the Norelco advertisement from Christmas's past where he says, "I loved it so much, I bought the company." That's me; I fell in love with the KOKO philosophy. It works and I can maintain a healthy lifestyle, feel good and keep working long hours without failing. Also, KOKO philosophy is not about killing yourself in the gym. I was overweight as a child and sadly my Mother had diabetes. I never wanted to have diabetes and of course did not want to be weak, fat, out of shape and not able to live the life I wanted due to physical limitation. On Valentine's Day, Consider Financial Gifts

Last year, Americans spent more than \$19 billion on Valentine's Day gifts, according to the National Retail Federation, with the majority of this money going to flowers, candy, cards and an evening out.

These gifts were thoughtful, of course, and no doubt appreciated, but they were also somewhat disposable, for want of a better word. On the other hand, some financial gifts can have a pretty long "shelf life."

Beyond simply enclosing some money in a card, what sort of financial gifts can you give? The answer depends somewhat on the recipient. For example, if your sweetheart is also your spouse, some of the gifts suggested below may be redundant to the financial moves you make together. However, if you aren't married, or if you and your spouse maintain separate finances, these ideas may make excellent Valentine's Day presents:


- IRA contributions Technically, you can't contribute directly to someone else's traditional or Roth IRA, but you can write a check to your loved one although, of course, he or she is free to use the money for any purpose. Like most people, your valentine may not usually contribute the yearly maximum amount which, in 2017, is \$5,500, or \$6,500 if you're 50 or older so your check should be quite welcome. A traditional IRA can grow on tax-deferred basis, and contributions may be tax-deductible. (Taxes are due upon withdrawal, and any withdrawals you make before you reach 59½ may be subject to a 10% IRS penalty. A Roth IRA's earnings are distributed tax-free, provided withdrawals aren't taken until the account owner is 59½ and has had the IRA for at least five years.
- Charitable gifts Consider making a gift to a charitable organization supported by your loved one. When you send cash to a qualified charity, you can get a tax deduction, but you might gain even bigger benefits by donating appreciated securities you've held for more than one year. By doing so, you can generally deduct the value of the securities, based on their worth when you make the gift. Plus, neither you nor the charity will have to pay capital gains taxes on the donated investments.
- Contributions to an emergency fund It's a good idea for everyone to maintain an emergency fund to cover unanticipated expenses, such as a major car repair, a new furnace or out-of-pocket medical bills. If your valentine doesn't have such a fund, consider helping him or her establish

one, with the money going to a liquid, low-risk account.

• **Gym membership** – Although not actually a "financial" gift, a gym membership can nonetheless bring some positive economic results to your valentine. For one thing, the insurance industry is providing more incentives to encourage people to exercise and live healthier lifestyles. But even if a gym membership doesn't give your loved one a break on insurance premiums, it can nonetheless result in better physical conditioning, which, in, turn, could ultimately result in lower medical costs.

On Valentine's Day, you may still want to get your sweetheart something associated with the holiday. But if it's within your means to do so, also consider one of the above suggestions for financial gifts. Your generosity will still be felt long after the chocolates are eaten and the flowers have faded.
